SUGGESTED FISTS CLUB CALLING FREQUENCIES

1.808 MHz (160m) – 3.528 MHz (80m) – 7.028 MHz (40m) – 10.118 MHz (30m) – 14.058 MHz (20m) – 18.085 MHz (17m) – 21.058 MHz (15m) – 24.918 MHz (12m) – 28.058 MHz (10m)

Members are reminded that the above frequencies are suggested calling frequencies. If they are busy, it is suggested that once you establish contact with a station, it may be prudent to change frequency down the band, avoiding other calling frequencies of known clubs.

Another welcomed is **Graham Hassall VK4HZX** #14145 from Top Camp, Queensland. Top Camp is a locality near the city of Toowoomba, located 9 kilometres (6 mi) from the city centre. Graham said I first heard about the 'Fists Club' some time ago from John, VK4TJ who lives not far away from me. Since then I have "ummd and arrd" about joining the club several times but never did anything about it. Finally, it was your advert that appeared on page 14 of the June 2012 edition of Amateur Radio Magazine that stirred me into action and to lodge a membership application. Graham Kindly supplied us with this personal profile: - G/day to all Fists Club members. My introduction to CW operating began in 1964 when I enlisted into the British Army. Eventually I applied for and passed the selection course to serve for about seven years in the British SAS. Amongst other things I worked often as a patrol or base signaller. Most radio communication work ware carried out by CW although VHF and SSB working were also used as required. In 1971 I transferred from the British Army into the Royal Australian Signals serving in a unit based near Sydney NSW.

In about 1974 I left the Australian Army and began working for the QLD Government. By 2003 and with retirement looming ahead for 2005, I began looking for possible retirement interests. For many years a Yaesu FRG 7 communications receiver had been permanently switched on at our home. However, of more interest to me was an Australian made, Leo Cohen manufactured 'Simplex' Auto Bug Key (Melbourne circa 1940) which had been given to me many years earlier. Only once had I used this key before, when in 1974 I was the Sydney Based Radio Operator for the Sydney to Rio De Janeiro Leg, of the Whitbread Round-the-World Yacht Race and for which the radio communications mode for this task was mostly CW. This Auto Simplex key had been a pleasure to use back then and so I decided to restore it and maybe Amateur Radio could be the place to use it again.

In 2006 I passed the Australian Foundation Licence exam obtaining the call sign VK4FZZX.

In 2007 I passed the Australian Standard Licence exam obtaining my current call sign VK4HZX. My radio interests are of course CW working used for 98% of the time, seeking for that elusive DX signal or for the signal not heard before.

Other radio interests include SSB working, VHF Digital Linking, VOIP, Satellite Tracking & Communications. However, I'm only a learner here and just tip toeing around these fascinating subjects.

Good Luck to you all. Good DX and pleased to work you on the bands but, please only around 20 WPM plus a little bit more/ or less, much faster than that and I can't write it down and at 72 years I can't remember it either. Current Key in use is a Vibroplex Vibrokeyer. We hope to have personal profiles of the other new members in a later edition of FISTS Down Under

CLUB CALLSIGN FOR FISTS DOWN UNDER AUSTRALIA

VK2FDU is the Australian call sign of Fists Down Under. As a national call sign, it's worth a valuable 5 points to those members who make contact with the station. VK2FDU also has a CC (Century Certificate) number.

As manager of VK2FDU, I have decided to trial the allocation of the call sign on a monthly basis. This allows a member to use it whenever it's convenient for them during 'their' month.

I'm pleased to report that we have several volunteers to operate VK2FDU until the end of 2012. However, more operators are always welcome and suitable times can be arranged.

So keep an ear out for VK2FDU on-air during the coming months. Activity will generally be around the Fists calling frequencies, depending on band condx. Skeds can be arranged with the operators.

Please consider volunteering to use the call sign. Even if you can only spare an hour or two, it's all appreciated and especially by those with whom you make contact.

If you would like to volunteer and help to promote the club, simply get in touch with Chris VK2CTN.

Notes on using VK2FDU

Who can use it? - All licensed VK members of the Fists Club can apply to use the call sign, in accordance with their own licence grade.

Do I need to send at 25 wpm? - No! All members are encouraged to use the call sign, irrespective of CW ability. Remember that 'accuracy transcends speed'. Give it a go!

How do I apply? - Contact Chris VK2CTN.

Do I have to use it for the whole month? -

No. The call sign is simply allocated to you for a month or whatever time suits you and it can be used during that period when convenient.

Is a log required? - Yes. An Excel spreadsheet is available which specifies all the info that needs to be recorded for both legal and club award requirements. If you don't have a computer, then a paper log is fine.


Who manages the QSLs? - Chris VK2CTN. He can send VK2FDU QSL cards to be completed by the operator and they can be returned to Chris. He can also complete QSLs on the operator's behalf.

QSLs are distributed via the Fists and WIA bureaux. Cards to VK stations are sometimes sent direct, along with info about the club and a membership application, HI.

28MHz Extended Double Zepp Loop Antenna

By Doc VK5BUG (ex VK5MGY R.M.S. Titanic APR - MAY 2012)





Notes:-

Orientation: 150 / 330 degrees Pole Center SSE / NNW = Mid Scandanavia / Iceland

Feedpoint: 4 Metres above ground on timber mast. Long Sides 16ft 11ins / Short Sides 5ft 5ins

Feedline: 450 ohm dogbone ladder line

Computer Modelled Gain: 8.31dbi (6.3dBd)

Take off angle: 23.9 degrees

Design Freq: 28.018MHz

Final Version as shown above made from 2 x 28MHz directors (ex VK5LB 5 ele yagi) 20 /15mm telescoped aluminum tubing top and bottom sections from 20mm aluminum tubing. Corner joints hammered flat, rotary wire brushed. Aliminox conductive paste both surfaces, 2 x SS bolts each corner silicon sealed and 3 coats of bronze plive outdoor paint ("colorband" range). Feedpoint 2x SS washers and conductive paste, separating copper wire and aluminium elements, 2x SS crews.
