The application for this award should be accompanied by a certified log extract, signed by 2 other licensed amateurs showing date, time, frequency, call sign and location of stations worked and enclose either \$A 10.00 or 10 IRC, and send to THE AWARDS MANAGER, REDCLIFFE and Districts Amateur RADIO CLUB, PO BOX 20 WOODY POINT QLD 4019, AUSTRALIA or email it to the clubs website <http://www.redclifferadioclub.org.au> or just type in Redcliffe radio club into your search engine for all the details.

SHACK VISIT


My Flexible Shack – ZL3GIL - Gilbert #14102

I was first licensed in 1987 as ZL2TDQ but I never transmitted a single squeak under that call sign. In 2005 after some idle internet trawling and the discovery of a stack of old Break-In magazines at a book fair I had to remind myself that I had enough know - how to assemble my own radio equipment. The only thing really holding me back from building a plethora of radio circuits was that I didn't know Morse code. Downloading Gary Bold's excellent Teach program from the NZART website steered me in the right direction. At this time I went to renew my long lapsed licence and was allocated the call sign ZL3UJZ. After about two years of practising with the Teach program I was delighted to tune in one evening to a QSO on 80m between two local operators and was amazed to be able to make sense of their dits and dahs. One of these operators was Fred Small ZL3FS and on 13 Sept 2008 Fred helped me break the ice with my first on - air CW QSO. Fred is SK now and I've chosen a vanity call sign but I hope that every QSO I have reflects the patience and courtesy that Fred showed me for that first CW contact.



At this QTH in Christchurch, New Zealand, the workshop is quite separate from the operating room. The workshop contains various components of both the through hole and the surface mount variety. I also have two (count them!) valves which I'll be using to assemble my 15m CW transmitter for the upcoming Sputnik anniversary which occurs in October each year. There's just the cat and me at this QTH so I have a great deal of freedom when it comes to spreading the radio circuits throughout the house. The back yard doesn't suffer too badly from the two inverted vee dipoles. One inverted vee is cut for 80m and hasn't been pruned for over a year so that's due for a pre - winter tweak. The other inverted vee is cut for 40m and I've marked 30m and 20m fold over points on it. It's setup for 40m most of the time, but occasionally I fold the points over for brief forays onto the other two bands. I prefer to use my homebrew equipment wherever I can. I do have a modicum of commercial equipment:

- NGC15C 15m CW/SSB xcvr for checking the international beacons on
- ICOM IC560 multimode 6m xcvr (awaiting RSM approval to operate 50 - 51MHz at time of writing)
- 2m and 70cm handhelds for local repeater and National System access



The photo of my living room table shows the nerve centre of my HF communications. I've assembled and now enjoy using the Small Wonder rigs for 80m, 40m, and 30m. The SW80 has been deployed for several contests and a couple of Straight Key nights as well as many, many rag chews. I've also built a RockMite rig for each of these bands but they haven't had their maiden voyages yet as I'm saving them for when I travel out of the city into areas with less QRM ; -) I also have a Cary regenerative receiver for 160m which been a delight to use in these winter months. My Queen's Birthday weekend project this year was the Berrow xcvr for 20m. Both the Cary and the Berrow are available as kits from Walford Electronics in the UK and are well worth considering if you're looking to dabble in some home brewing.

The RockMites sit atop a Tait T286 PSU which is also used to power up the MKARS80 80m SSB xcvr which is located in the photo close to Her Highness and the MST400 40m SSB xcvr (not pictured here). I built the SWR meter from an article seen in 'Radio and Electronics Cookbook' by George Brown M5ACN but I'm waiting for the public library to tell me when they've retrieved the book from the central library. The M6.3 seismic event of Feb 2011 gave the library shelves what for and I believe they're still sifting through the many thousands of tomes.



The key is a Hi Mound HK - 706 and there is a better photo of it in the FISTS Key Gallery. One day I hope to acquire one of the Supreme keys for some top quality brass pounding ☺

As you'll see from the photo, my operating desk/table contains other useful accessories such as pens and pencils galore, the coffee coaster, and a wee plastic jar of chocolate confectionery which are handy for when the chef is on strike hi hi.

Also shown is my furry radio buddy, Stella, who is not licensed. Her excuse is she never had the Latin. The old adage has it that "You can lead a horse to water but you cannot make him drink". The photo below shows that you can lead a cat to the straight key but.....

FISTS AWARDS

FISTS North America has sent us this update about some of the FISTS awards.

From what we heard in Dayton, people want more reasons to get on the air. We are working on an award that will be announced July 1 (still working out the loopholes and details), but to hold people over until then, we've decided to offer endorsements on some of the awards to stimulate interest.

The FISTS Worked All States is now available with a single - band endorsement. For those with a WAS, endorsement stickers will be sent for the bands worked (all bands count as long as the contact is 2xCW). Contacts must have been made on or after June 1, 2013.

The Rag Chewers Certificate is now available with single - band endorsements. Again, the contacts must be made after June 1, 2013 and be 2XCW. Endorsement stickers will be sent to those with existing Rag chewer Certificates.

Now that the Anniversary Celebration is over, the Anniversary award versions 2 and 3 have gone away, and version 1 has been renamed the Perpetual Prefix Award, since there is no ending date to it. To encourage more activity, starting June 1st, 2013, prefix endorsements are now available for the Perpetual Prefix Award.

In addition to the basic award requirements, Prefix Endorsements will be issued for the following increments, 50, 100, and 150 prefixes. Logs for these Prefix Endorsements must have all QSOs shown, including ALL QSOs used for the original Prefix Award.

* 50 Prefix Endorsement issued as follows;

Work 5 different prefixes in each of the 0 - 9 numbered call areas in addition to the original required 25 prefixes, for a total of 30 different prefixes in each 0 - 9 numbered call area. Total QSOs in the log will be 300.

* 100 Prefix Endorsement issued as follows;

Work 10 different prefixes in each of the 0 - 9 numbered call areas in addition to the original required 25 prefixes, for a total of 35 different prefixes in each 0 - 9 numbered call area. Total QSOs in the log will be 350.

* 150 Prefix Endorsement issued as follows;

Work 15 different prefixes in each of the 0 - 9 numbered call areas in addition to the original required 25 prefixes, for a total of 40 different prefixes in each 0 - 9 numbered call area. Total QSOs in the log.

We considered making working FISTS members a requirement for the Prefix Endorsements, but it is difficult enough to just find someone on the air to work - and if there are enough FISTS trying for the endorsements, they will run into each other on the air anyway. Plus, looking just for FISTS prefixes

on the air comes off as elitist, and causes more number chasing, because many of our hard - core number chasers won't answer someone if they aren't on their list of FISTS members.

This way if they need their prefix, they will make the contact and hopefully tell them about the award and a bit about FISTS. Plus, I always hear "where 999*are all the FISTS?" and by not requiring FISTS numbers for this endorsement, it takes care of that problem since they don't have to find a FISTS member to work toward the requirement.

In keeping with the rules of the original award, the Rag Chewers and FISTS WAS have to be QSOs between FISTS members
