Welcome folks to the September issue and again many apologies for the lateness of publication. I was away the first few weeks on a French trip and then last week just catching up!! I shall make this reasonably short so that it gets out to you, but I'm not too worried as you've had another excellent KN to read as well this month.

Graham and I had an email from Martin DL1GBZ recently but he made the text into a PDF and sent that as an attachment. Graham and I deleted it so it took some time before it was read. Please, if you send us emails, make them look like real emails!! I will not open PDFs unless the body of the email looks VERY much like it's pukka! Anyway, Martin says this...thank you Martin for the super feedback.

Hi Graham and David,

This is my report concerning MKW. First of all, congrats for the organization I really enjoyed the event. Before it started I did store my paddles in the cupboard in order not to fall into temptation. The overall result is that I had a lot of fun and I enjoyed the unusual mode of operation.

As I know CW events that fall short of being called a "contest" - I did not subscribe to illusions about the number of participants. When reading the rules, the non-contesters think "gee, this is a contest" and contesters start reading and cry out "gee, this is not a contest".

In practice, I was using a Kent pump for the cq calling by the left hand and a Junker for the slow contacts plus a bug (crafted by the late g3hge) for the contacts at moderate speeds. I understood that cq calling is the only way to be heard, any s+p is bound to create nothing but boredom.

I admit that my attention was not undivided, on Saturday, I tried to look for "Churches On The Air" (chota as organized by wacral.org). The list of churches was impressive but 40m is a bit too overcrowded. Eventually I worked a church in Hastings and I heard one more from England and one from Scotland. My ambition was not to try an leave empty handed. So many churches in the UK made the effort to get a GB call from

ofcom. Moreover, I felt being obliged to give out a few points in the SSB W.A.E. contest. I think it was my first fone contest ever to send in a log. It is the major German dx contest, and for several reasons I was the only one in my local DARC chapter to have time. The local needs the extra points for the internal ranking of clubs. It was a nice experience but this is not really for me. Barefoot with wire antennas is nice for Morse but a quite hard for ssb. I hope that others will do this job in the future. I stay with cw.

In the MKW, the first observation was that the cardinal hours did not work. Not even once I perceived an increase of activity and I gave up soon and went on air whenever I felt like being on air. The fists I heard were all quite good, some had a typical swing but none deserved any criticism for poor cw. Moreover, there was just a single incident of deliberate qrm, probably from a militant qrp fanatic that feels compelled chase away those that come too close to an uncoordinated beacon on 3555.5

A bitter pill was rather the geomagnetic storm on the 2nd Monday with a planetary K-index of 7. After it 20m was almost a total loss here and 40m suffered from qsb. It's also bitter that very few Fists members were in my log.

FLC was lovely and it understood the adif tag about my keys perfectly well. I admit (shame on me) that I would have loved the FLC to enter the FISTS numbers magically but I understand that this is not done for educational reasons. I expected this and tried to download a member list but I did not find one on the web page of the British web page. There was one on the American page though.

My wish would have been to allow 30 meters as well, provided that the necessary measures are taken to avoid the smell of contesting. The only way to avoid this stench is not to define what has to be exchanged. It is good enough to specify what has to be logged. 30m is precious even between stations on the British isles. The no skip zone of 20m is always an obstacle. Given the low number of participants, it is worth to consider the idea to join all mechanical keys for all activity weeks of this type. Bug alone and Straight key alone is under the critical mass, isn't it? Did anybody see the unicorn using a fully automatic mechanical bug? I didn't.

Finally, the best of it all is that quite a few contacts turned out to become rag chews, even guys over 80 showed a tremendous perseverance to use mechanical keys even for half an hour or more.

Some good comments Martin. The cardinal hours is one I also note...I try to use them but see little uplift. Still, it's not afunctional part of the activity so we can live with it maybe.

As to 30m, I fully agree we should use it but several other members of FISTS argue strongly against. I argue that as we aren't a contest at all we can use it. As you rightly point out, there is no reason we shouldn't have simple activities on that band and we do!! We have had 30m and 60m activities for last few years and they worked well. No doubt they will be repeated.

Social aspects of radio

In the latest KN Rob, MOBPT points out that radio has become a solitary affair and this is quite so from my perspective too. I had many friends locally with whom I would natter and share the ups and downs of operating and building etc. Sadly, most are now SK and a few others have left the area which means that I am rather on me tod. I do have friends here of course and some are into radio, but not in the same way and none are into CW. As a result my own enjoyment has fallen to such an extent that this, along with band condx, has caused me to sell my main FTdx101MP and soon my hex beam too. I have the K2 which is in use and I have just worked IZ4IST, Mauro, but frankly, the joy is much diminished.

The club I used to belong to seems moribund and with age related dislike of night-driving I am not prepared to drive an hour or more to another club. The days of many amateurs in the town are gone and we have no FM 2m repeaters (curse CTCSS!!!). I sit for days on end with 145.500 in listening mode and hear nothing. My own CQ's rare now, are usually unanswered and don't even speak of 144.300. (Curse the demise of Class B!!). Frankly I sit here some days and wonder why anyone would join amateur radio ranks at all! It seems to me that whilst the RSGB et al are putting effort into 'spreading the word' a lot of it is aimed at digital and computers. Maybe this is what newer generations want, but it is not what amateur radio is about surely? Is amateur radio about sending an electronic email to someone or is it about sharing the love of radio (amateur does come from amor, to love!).
